


### **Enchanted Valley: Exploring our Valley's Treasures**

### **Opera Discovery Concert Series**

Join us for this two-day series presented by award-winning opera professional and educator **Natalie Mann**, who holds a Doctor of Music from Indiana University.

# Why Does the Soprano Have to Die? Monday, October 2, 2-3:30 pm

Opera has many traditions—and one of the most famous is how the female heroine meets a tragic fate. The stereotype is so commonplace that it became a sports analogy when sportswriter Dan Cook penned in 1976, "the opera ain't over until the fat lady sings." In this lecture, we will observe how composers use soprano voices as tragic heroines, looking at the compositional and storytelling aspects of the operas. Natalie Mann will present a fresh perspective on how listeners can evaluate operas. In addition to the lecture, she will also be performing selected arias live with pianist Bruce Mangum.



### Are Baritones Always the Bad Guys? Tuesday, October 3, 2-3:30 pm

Poor baritones... an often under-appreciated voice type who are found in almost every opera. But their characters are crucial and often essential drivers to many operatic plots. We will delve into how composers use the baritone and bass/baritone voices as the antagonists to propel the story forward. **Natalie Mann** will discuss how listeners can go beyond the music and libretto to uncover deeper meaning in operas. In addition to the lecture, **Patrick Blackwell**, a baritone from the LA Opera, will also be performing selected arias live with pianist **Bruce Mangum**.



### Coachella Valley Classical Voices Wednesday, October 18, 7–8 pm

Now starting its second season, Coachella Valley Classical Voices (formerly Met to Broadway) entertains you with local, professionally trained singers presenting a program of your favorite opera and Broadway selections. Back by popular demand for its second performance at the Library, the troupe of local singers now features over 15 artists with selections in different languages and varied styles.

### Joey Leone • AM Radio Memories & One Hit Wonders

### Wednesday, November 1, 7-8 pm

Before cell phones, Spotify, iPods, CDs, and computers, there was the transistor radio—from the family car stereo and large tabletop version to the portable battery powered radio you could hold in your hand. **Joey Leone** takes an in-depth yet lighthearted look at the songs that came out of our AM radios during the 60s, 70s, and 80s. These include unforgettable songs recorded by prolific hit makers, including several "one hit wonders" by obscure artists who would never be



heard from again! Leone adds fun facts, musical insights, and personal stories about the music that gave us so many "AM Radio Memories."

Leone's passion for rock & roll, blues, and jazz started when he was a young man growing up in the multi-cultural neighborhood of Bushwick Brooklyn in New York City, and his primary access to music was the New York City Public Library system. He has been playing music for over forty years, and has performed, toured, and recorded with artists as diverse as Albert Collins, Etta James, Vic Damone, Chaka Khan, Sam & Dave, Joe Perry (Aerosmith), Wilson Pickett, and Chubby Checker.

### **Quarteto Nuevo**


### Wednesday, November 15, 7-8 pm

Quarteto Nuevo merges western classical, Eastern European folk, Latin, and jazz with an organic feel that packs a wallop! The ensemble composes new movements for its *Jazz Road Suite* celebrating each state they visit. Quarteto's master musicians create emotionally charged soundscapes with sensibilities that represent very different world cultures. Their unique instrumentation—soprano sax (**Damon Zick**), cello (**Jacob Szekely**), guitar (**Kenton Youngstrom**), and percussion (**Felipe Fraga**)—richly colors their wide-ranging repertoire.

### Behind the Scenes with James B. Harris

Veteran Hollywood industry figure and Rancho Mirage resident James B. Harris has had an indelible impact on American cinema, serving triple duty as a producer, director, and screenwriter. He partnered with legendary director Stanley Kubrick to produce several provocative classics including The Killing, Paths of Glory, and Lolita before moving on to produce and direct The Bedford Incident, along with a number of other feature films, working with the likes of Sidney Poitier, Richard Pryor, James Woods, Wesley Snipes, and Dennis Hopper. Harris will join us in the Community Room to screen some of his most well-known films with introductions from award-winning producer **Steven C. Smith**, followed by a moderated discussion and Q&A session.

Crook Johnny Clay assembles a five-man team to plan and execute a daring racetrack robbery.


### Paths of Glory (1957) Wednesday, November 8, 2-4 pm



# Observatory

### **Great American Eclipse!** Saturday, October 14, 8–11 am

We are taking a journey down the road to gather at the **Rancho Mirage Community Park** to view a partial solar eclipse as the Moon passes between Earth and the Sun. Join us at the park to safely view this wonderful event through our telescopes equipped with special solar filters, learn more about eclipses, and create your own pinhole projection viewer!

8:08 am—partial eclipse begins

9:26 am—maximum eclipse: 73% of the Sun's disk will be blocked by the Moon!

10:53 am—partial eclipse ends

It is important to *always* use the proper eye protection when viewing the Sun. This requires special-purpose eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewers that meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard for such products. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun. The Rancho Mirage Library and Observatory will have certified eclipse glasses on hand the day of the program and available for giveaway at Observatory programs leading up to the event.

### **OPENights**

Observatory Public Exploration Nights are your portal to the Universe! Join us at the Rancho Mirage Observatory to glimpse beyond our world through our PlaneWave Instruments CDK 700 telescope. Ask questions and learn fun facts from astronomers and volunteer docents as you take in 100–350x magnified views of planets, nebulae, star clusters, and more (weather permitting). No registration is necessary for this drop-in, open-house-style event. Due to the capacity limits of the Observatory, you may experience a short wait, but everyone will have a chance to get in. 
### Teen Movie • The Hunger Games

Thursday, November 16, 4-5 pm



Writers will then be asked to draft a short story from a rover's point of view much like Resilience from *A Rover's Story*. Each writer will have an opportunity to read their work aloud to the group and receive feedback.

### Food Science Experiment— Apple Oxidation and Soil-Free Planter (Ages 7+)

Tuesday, November 21, 4-5 pm

Students will learn what keeps apples from turning brown in an oxidation experiment using the scientific method to explore how apple slices react when coated with different liquids. Is it possible to grow plants without soil? Yes, it is! Plants only need water, air, and light to grow. Students will be introduced to hydroponics and will create a soil-free planter that they will be able to take home to continue their scientific studies by sprouting beans.

In preclinical animal models, he discovered that consuming all calories within a consistent 8–12 hours or time-restricted feeding can sustain daily rhythms in anabolic and catabolic metabolism. Such temporal regulation of metabolism can prevent or reverse chronic diseases and increase lifespan. 






# James Reginato • Growing Up Getty: The Story of America's Most Unconventional Dynasty
